### The Foreshore Trail is now closed to dogs until June 30th

Based on recent observations by local naturalists and biologists, and recommendations by the Foreshore Trail Monitoring Advisory Group which includes dog walkers, SABNES, Greenways and Trail Alliance representatives, the City has shifted the dog walking ban to **May 1—June 30 in** order to better align with the peak nesting season. Trail users are **asked to continue** to report all disturbances or bylaw infractions by emailing trailreport@shuswaptrails.com (Attach photos if available.) Also call the animal control hotline at **250-833-8492.** We have had reports of dogs roaming freely around the Osprey tower at the end of the spit of

land close to the wharf (the Kime Trail). We request that these instances be likewise reported. Please show respect to fellow trail users and compliment those dog-walkers who are respecting the by-laws.



### **SABNES President's Report**

I have some good news for those of you who spent time helping plant the hummocks in 2017. When my husband Dave and I walked the hummocks a month or so ago, we saw Pacific Willow but little else. When Sarah Weaver, Geoff Benson and I walked the hummocks this past week, I was delighted. There is a wide variety of shrubs now in leaf, and even a number of conifers have survived. We saw Wild Rose, Red Osier Dogwood, a few Trembling Aspen and a variety of Willows.

Kim Fulton, who supervised the planting, later toured the hummocks and gave them a score of 8.5/10! I was delighted!



He said, "Overall, I am pleased with how they're progressing. Many of our plantings are "free to grow" and others have risen above the competitive invasive plants. My understanding is that the Sweet Clover, which was a dominant invasive particularly on second hummock (from the East), has gifted the hummocks with fixed-nitrogen and will also nurture the bees. I am pleased that the Red Osier Dogwood is coming into its own. Our goal of creating a more diverse habitat for all creatures is well on its way. It will take a few more years for the system to stabilize."

Gary Lomax has served on our SABNES Board for over 10 years. He has served as President and has donated his skills and countless hours. He is stepping down this year from the Board, but you may still




see him mending something on the trail now and again. All the best, Gary, and thank you for your many years of service.

# Being Extra Pleasant to a Pheasant

Today I was driving along 20<sup>th</sup> St and two pheasants ran out into the road. I swerved to avoid them and missed one but the male ran into the side of my car with a sickening thump, thump, thump. I looked in the mirror and he was sitting at the side of the road. I turned around to go back and check on him and, as I returned, I saw him run across the road to the other shoulder. Just as I was thinking he was going to be okay he fell over on the grass then got up and fell over onto the road. I couldn't leave him there dying a slow death on the road so after calls to the RCMP, Conservation, the SPCA and Karen Beggs, Shuswap Vet agreed to take him. **He** 

**survived!** After a few hours, we took him back to find his mate and off he ran.

### **Beaver Benefits**

Beavers have been busy at the foreshore in Salmon Arm. Wire wrapped around the trees have not deterred them; instead, each section of wire has been carefully chewed around. The image on the right was taken November 29, 2018 at the original beaver pond on the SABNES - Raven trail.



The image on the left is how the tree looked on December 17, 2018:



And by December 26, 2018, as the image on the left shows, the felled tree had been carted off -- presumably by a beaver.

What do other Canadian cities do about beaver? Beaver Management Guidelines in Oshawa and Red Deer mention the significance of beaver in the ecosystem, but also talk about problems of blocked culverts and downstream flooding. In some places beaver trapping is part of a management process. I doubt that the beaver activity on the **SABNES** trail will lead to flooding, or blocked culverts. Instead, I see


a pond created by the damming of a creek which would normally be draining directly into the marsh area.

The habitat provided gives much more diversity than what would normally be there. While there is no doubt it is sad to see a large tree felled, most are willows and poplars which will regenerate from the stump.

In the fall of 2012 Salmon Arm Council agreed that **SABNES** could manage the "issue" of beavers felling trees on the foreshore trail. This is an extract from the November 2012 issue of the SABNES newsletter:

SABNES does not want to interfere with the beavers, who are important members of wetlands ecosystems. Decapitated willows rapidly regenerate themselves. Nevertheless, SABNES will continue to protect the larger trees by surrounding their lower trunks with wire netting. Trees which become hazardous will be cut down and tossed into the area near the pond to provide the beavers with sustenance.

We need to revisit the policy of wiring trees. While wire has successfully deterred some beaver from chewing trees, the foregoing pictures show that it is not wholly successful. And wire requires maintenance; it does not take long before



tree bark grows around it. The beaver pond is one of my favorite places to visit on the nature trail. It is peaceful, and there is always a kingfisher, or flicker, or scores of blackbirds, to accompany my thoughts. Thanks to the beavers for creating it.
