

Work Party August 2011

This year, lake levels remained high until the end of July. The bird-tower boardwalk sustained extensive water damage. With the assistance of a grant from the **Shuswap Community Foundation** we were able to replace two sections of the boardwalk and make other improvements.

SABNES is pleased with the **City of Salmon Arm's** initiative in implementing a facelift to a **225**-metre section of the trail extending west from a point 600 metres from the Raven end.

This segment had experienced serious erosion and gravel depletion due to flooding. Gravel has been added to raise the path by about **20cm**. Willow sprigs have been planted and matting placed along the bank to mitigate erosion.

Thanks again to all our stakeholders who continue to cooperate and work with us to maintain our mandate to preserve and enhance this unique natural area of the Bay. Please make sure your memberships are current and encourage others to join and support our organisation.

The Government of Canada high water level for the year was recorded at **348.863** metres about July 25th, while the records of the City indicated a high level of **348.63** June 25 - 28. The high water level in **2008** was **348.74 m.** June 9th.

On June 30th we counted **91** adult Western Grebes and one Clark's Grebe, 8 nests and two newly hatched young grebes. The Grebes were still courting despite many nests having been destroyed the previous night by a wind storm which created waves. Eight nests were still intact. On July 2, **Clive Bryson** observed that strong winds through the night had wiped out the remaining nests.

On July 6th the Grebes were spread out all over Salmon Arm Bay. We counted **84** adults, **10** young and one nest. The lake water level was in decline, at **348.51 metres.**


We continued to count the Grebes even though the situation appeared

somewhat dismal. By July 20 there were 19 young, and the total keeps on rising. On August 10th we counted 155 adults, 70 young which we think were from 54 families. August 24 we counted again, 197 adults, 111 juveniles. Our count of families was 76. Its quite likely that the number of families is slightly high because some of the young are quite developed and don't necessarily remain close together. It is remarkable that so many young have hatched despite the destruction of nests during wind events at high water.

Thanks to the Canada Summer

Jobs Grant from the Federal Govern-

ment, together with a \$2,000 Grants-in-Aid from the City of Salmon Arm, we were able to hire a student for 14 weeks this summer. Liz Foster did a fine job of managing the Brighouse Nature Centre. Liz particularly enjoyed working with school groups and young children. An estimated 1800 people made contact with the BNC over the summer. Thanks also to members and helpers who also volunteered to staff the centre.



There were 213 Grebes on May 21, 10 days later, and the lake level had escalated by **0.77** metres. In the next **10** days the level increased by 0.95 m., which is about **4 inches** per day. The grebes were not as easily found during the count. We counted only **121** Grebes, likely the Grebes were nesting though it wasn't otherwise noticeable.

The first nests were seen by us June 8, we counted 9 between the Prestige Inn and Peter Jannink Park. On June 15 we counted 22 nests in the same area, and the water level was 348.42 and only rose to 348.50 the following

In early August I received a call from Peigi MacMillan in the Brighouse Nature Centre saying she'd received a report that a large raptor was down on the grass near the wharf ,with people milling around. Pam grabbed a blanket and we went there to find an immature osprey looking bewildered. I went fairly close and told it that it was a silly bird for leaving its nest too early, while Pam went up behind it and dropped a blanket on it. The

nest by the wharf still had its 3 young so we looked at the nest in front of the Prestige which had only 1 youngster, but had had two the day before. The Prestige receptionist gave us a key for an upper floor and with the help of Don, the groundskeeper, we put the bird on the pool roof opposite the nest. When we went back a while later, both chicks were in the nest.

At the beginning of October there was an osprey on the wharf railing and a group of people watching it. When it flew off I noticed it had an injured left leg. I went back a couple of days later and it was again on the railing with people taking photographs of it. While it was intently looking into the water for fish I quietly went up behind it. In one swift careful move I plucked it off the railing holding its wings and legs. When I talked to it quietly it rotated its head and looked at me straight in the eye, but never struggled. A kind couple from Toronto (I didn't have my car), drove me to Shuswap Veterinary Clinic where I



left it. Next day I went back to the clinic and was told the osprey had suffered a dislocated hock which they had been able to relocate, and they'd fed it by tube. Because it was so thin they were sending it to the Bird Rehabilitation Centre in Kamloops so that it could be fattened up.

Because I fish I have always felt an affinity to ospreys, even though there were none in Britain when I was young (there are about 200 pairs nesting now in U.K.). **Mike Saul**

We continue to survive financially because of generous funding from various sources and also from our loyal members, both individual and corporate. Special thanks for a Canada Summer Jobs grant of \$4,813 and also \$2,000 from the City of Salmon Arm Grants-in-Aid program which covered the cost of hiring Liz Foster as interpreter at the **BNC** this summer. To-date we have received memberships and donations totalling \$3,363 including one life membership. Our major expenses have been making necessary repairs and improvements to the boardwalks. Thanks to the **Shuswap Community Foun**dation for a grant of \$3,000 which has been used for some of these repairs and also to purchase a trimmer for trail maintenance.
